Professor Amy Fairchild

Amy Fairchild, PhD, MPH, is a historian whose work assesses both the failures and successes of state action in the name of the common good. Her books, Science at the Borders: Immigrant Medical Inspection and the Shaping of the Modern Industrial Labor Class (Johns Hopkins) and Searching Eyes: Privacy, the State, and Disease Surveillance in America (University of California, with Ronald Bayer and James Colgrove), underscore the importance of considering policy in its specific, contested contexts. She co-chaired a WHO committee that, this summer, will issue the first international guidelines on public health surveillance. Fairchild has been engaged in examining the role of evidence and values in shaping ecigarette policy. With funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Greenwall Foundation, she is also working to understand fear, crisis, and panic as recurring tools for shaping both public health policy and institutions. Fairchild is the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs and Professor Health Policy and Management at Texas A&M University.

# EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

Objectives for the talk will be to reframe our understandings of social panic and fear. Unpacking the social meaning and political work of dread emotions requires not simply locating events in particular times and places but identifying major change over time. Both panic and fear serve as a modes of dramatic framing that can be used to manage or even manipulate events as much as to describe them. The aim is not simply to establish a fresh historical understanding, but to rethink, in a way that is relevant to contemporary public health crises, collective panic as a potent means of institution-building and policy-making.
